FACTS ABOUT HOMELESSNESS

- **The Nature of Homelessness**
- According to 1995 Census Bureau statistics, 36.4 million people are at or below the poverty line. One in 10 of these become homeless.
- The homeless population is diverse:
 - 25-40% work
 - 37% are families with children
 - 25% are children
 - 25-30% are mentally disabled
 - 30% are veterans
 - 40% are drug or alcohol dependent
 - 15% are both mentally disabled and substance abusers
- The homeless population is quite diverse in terms of their length of homelessness and the number of times they cycle in and out of homelessness.
 - Research indicates that 40% of homeless people have been homeless less than six months and 70% were homeless less than two years.
- Currently, it appears that 12 million adult residents of the United States have been literally homeless at some point in their lives
- Homeless people are twice as likely as the general population to have chronic health problems, but are less likely to have access to adequate health care.
- For the more than 750,000 children who are homeless annually, inability to obtain school records and lack of transportation are primary barriers to public education. Almost 23% of school-aged homeless children are regularly shut out from school.
- A 10-year study from 1988 to 1997 indicates that homelessness has experienced a dramatic increase in the U.S. over the past two decades.
 - On any given night there are 750,000 homeless people and only 250,000 spaces available in shelters.
 - For those who do not obtain shelter, the most common places to stay are automobiles (59%) and makeshift housing, such as tents, boxes, caves or boxcars (25%)
- **Causes of homelessness:**
 - In 100% of the U.S. cities surveyed, supply of affordable housing is insufficient to meet the need. In 76% of cities there is a shortage of emergency shelter beds and transitional housing slots to accommodate homeless residents.
 - Of those surveyed, in 41% of the transitional housing programs that were planned, the existing community attempted to obstruct or block the project.
 - Fewer than 30% of those eligible for low-income housing receive it.
 - Lagging Incomes: Incomes for the poorest Americans have not kept pace with rising housing costs. Millions of workers are shut out of the private housing market.
 - Slashed services and Government Assistance: As earned income for the poor decreased, assistance programs were severely cut. Fewer than 14% of disabled homeless people receive disability benefits.

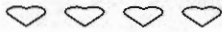
THE STREET LAWYER

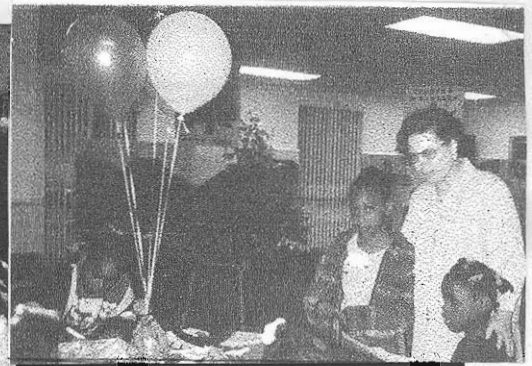

We give God all the glory for what He did in this meeting. ♥



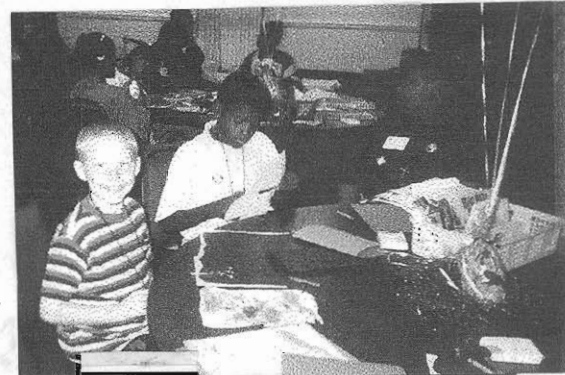
THE EASTER CELEBRATION

"Oohs" and "ahs" and exclamations of excitement filled the air as the children and mothers from the shelters stepped into the specially-decorated room at Evangel Assembly of God Church in Camp Springs, MD. Everywhere were shimmering balloons, streamers, lights, decorations and props that contributed to the fantastic Easter Celebration that was about to take place. Approximately 80 children and mothers from 3 area shelters, (Park Rd., NW Wash., D.C.; Community of Hope II, S.E. Wash., D.C.; Shepherd's Cove, Seat Pleasant, MD) attended the event on Sunday, April 16. The excitement lasted all evening as the families participated in Easter egg dying, fun and laughter and prizes with Hillbilly Harriette (Diana McConatay) and Daisy Mae, (Rachel Hamelman), beautiful praise and worship music with Marianne Benson and Pete Hyde and then a delicious full-course spaghetti dinner. The dinner was expertly prepared and served by Deborah Nelson and her efficient team and the guests were able to have seconds and even thirds of this sumptuous feast. Pies and cakes, courtesy of Safeway provided at least one piece of cake for everyone after the meal, as well as one whole pie per family for each of the 24 families to take back to the shelters.

As the time came to dismiss the mothers into the Evangel Assembly's main sanctuary to see the beautiful Easter drama, babies were taken to the nursery and children and teens stayed behind with Hillbilly Harriette. While the mothers were being ministered to in the main sanctuary, the children were being led through a dynamic series of Bible activities in Hillbilly Haven. As they progressed through the Bible from Genesis to Revelation, using the brightly colored props and banners around the room, their understanding of Jesus and Biblical truth grew, culminating in a giant altar call at the end of the service. Diana McConatay, (Hillbilly Harriette) described it this way: "I now know what the Bible

means when it says the crowds thronged Jesus." The press of children at the end of the performance wanting to get saved was so great that nothing could restrain them from storming the front of the room where Diana stood. Forty-one children came to the Lord. We truly give God all the glory for what He has done and will continue to do in these lives. In the main sanctuary many of the mothers had also responded to the altar call and had gone forward to receive Christ.

As the time came to go home, bags of socks, underwear, hygiene items, beanie babies, baseball cards, crocheted Easter baskets full of candy and other goodies were handed to each family.

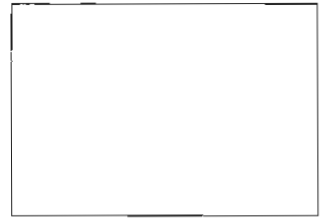
