TIME FOR COMPASSION

As Thanksgiving approaches, volunteers for The Homeless Outreach have much to be thankful for. Recently, we participated in the food distribution sponsored by D.C. Central Kitchen. We were able to help distribute seven tractor trailers of food donated by the Produce Marketing Association. The food, including produce and fruit, was given to about 70 organizations which help the homeless and needy in the Metropolitan Washington, D.C. area. All present were grateful to the donors and D.C. Central Kitchen. But I have no doubt the hungry people receiving this food were the most thankful.

Another source of crucial aid has been the Department of Defense. Together with Kenny Friedman of Washington, D.C.'s Emergency Psychiatric Response Division, The Homeless Outreach has received a donation from D.O.D. of 20,000 wool blankets for homeless people. We are giving them away on the streets to people in need, and to other organizations with street ministries. The blankets are in abundance. Volunteers are needed to help with The Homeless Outreach street ministry. An inner city location for convenient storage is also needed.

We are also thankful for all the coats and socks recently donated by Corkran Methodist Church. These have all been given away, mostly to homeless women. Coats, hats, gloves, thermal underwear, socks, and warm clothing are greatly needed. The successful efforts of many organizations and individuals last winter reduced the loss of life among homeless from freezing to one person; the previous winter claimed nine lives.

The compassionate ladies of Waldorf, MD who so faithfully provided home-made soup last winter have committed to do so again this year. The bearers of hot soup, sandwiches, and hot beverage are especially welcomed on cold nights.

The Homeless Outreach encourages you to participate in the direct ministry to homeless people. The workers are few, the homeless crowd is great; and you will be blessed in return.

FIRE DESTROYS CHURCH PROPERTY

A fire completely destroyed the Talbert House, 4911 St. Barnabas Road, late in the evening of November 2nd. The property, owned by Our Savior Lutheran Church, had been used in the past as a counseling center, Sunday School, Lutheran Social Services branch office, housing for seminarians, and as an office and storage space for The Homeless Outreach. It was currently being used by the Interfaith Community Action Council for a food pantry, and as temporary housing for two families.

The building and all its contents were destroyed. The food pantry lost its supply of food and all its equipment, including five refrigerators and a freezer, all cabinets and numerous files. The loss did not deter the pantry volunteers, who quickly organized to dispense needed food on an emergency basis. The food pantry volunteers hope to relocate to a permanent location by the end of November. The two families using the building as temporary quarters also lost everything. The Homeless Outreach supplied them with clothing that evening, the National Church of God brought more the next day, and the Red Cross and other organizations have relocated the families and provided additional assistance.

The church does not have any plans to rebuild soon.

Because of only one shelter, the crowd size was not as great as we have experienced at other recent parties, (about 30 in attendance), but individual attention was given and much love was shared.
